

Director's Message: Annual Report for FY 2013

December 2013

TO: Board of Directors, Second Judicial District Department of Correctional Services

Fiscal Year 2013 has been a year of transitions in the Second Judicial District Department of Correctional Services. Six of our ten work units saw a change in leadership during this fiscal year. In June, our District Director Dorothy Faust announced she would be leaving to take a job with the Department of Corrections. Despite the many changes in the Department's table of organization, our staff has continued to implement positive improvements to support our mission. Some of the key initiatives from fiscal year 2013 include:

- Continued commitment to our committee based participative structure.
- Full utilization of the Minimum Risk Program which allowed the Department to devote more resources to higher risk offenders.
- Expansion of our Fort Dodge program of continuity of supervision between field and residential services to Mason City and Marshalltown. This allows offenders to keep the same supervising officer regardless of whether they are supervised in the field or a residential facility.
- Implementation of the ACTV curriculum for male offenders with a history of engaging in domestic violence in Ames, Fort Dodge and Marshalltown.
- Enhanced focus on improving the quality of all services provided by (1) continuing randomized auditing of the Iowa Risk Assessment, (2) implementing a system of general casework audits, and (3) a re-commitment to establishing and achieving performance expectations through recurrent comprehensive performance reviews of all employees.
- Increased collaboration between Second District, the Department of Corrections and the Iowa Board of Parole which has furthered the offender re-entry process.

In addition to the above, I would like to emphasize some specific information contained in this year's Annual Report:

- There was a significant increase in our high risk offender population. As a result, the Intensive Supervision Program saw a 28% increase in total clients served.
- The Minimum Risk Program served 977 offenders in FY 2013 as compared to 384 in FY 2012. It is notable that despite the large increase in population served, the number of offenders successfully completing the program also increased this year from 75% to 84.1%. This is a very positive indicator of the success of the Minimum Risk Program and further supports the practice of matching the level of supervision to the risk level of the offender.
- Average daily costs for probation/parole general supervision were calculated to be \$2.76 per day; intensive supervision to be \$6.47 per day; and sex offender supervision to be \$14.07 per day. Average daily cost for residential services was \$87.58 per day.
- Based on 3-year follow-up figures, recidivism rates for the FY 2010 cohort remained generally steady.

I would like to extend a sincere thank you to the hardworking Department staff who have made all of the above possible. In addition I would like to thank our Board of Directors, Advisory Committee members, community partners, and our colleagues in other agencies that partner with us to advance the mission.

Second District Overview / History

1977-1980

Senate File 112 instituted Judicial District Departments of Correctional Services through Iowa. A Board of Directors was implemented as governing authority and the first Residential Facilities were opened in Fort Dodge, Ames and Marshalltown. Accreditation was completed in 1980 and offices were established in 3 communities.

1981-1990

During this decade client education programs OWI and sex offender treatment were offered. Curt Forbes Residential Center was built. A programmer/analyst was hired to incorporate data. Risk and needs assessment/case classification was adopted. Corrections took over work release and parole per legislation. The first collective bargaining agreement was negotiated and Administrative accreditation was achieved.

1991-2000

During the 1990's money was received from Legislature to begin relocate Marshalltown Residential Center. The Mason City Residential Center was built and the legislature recommended new construction for the Fort Dodge Residential Center. Low risk offenders were reviewed for early discharge or lower supervision standards. Several other treatment programs began to be offered pertaining to Batterer's Education, Substance Abuse, Cognitive Programming Anger Management and Day Program Center. Second District also led the way to LSI-R risk assessment and participated in decision making for the Iowa Correctional Offender Network (ICON). A psychologist and polygraph examiner were hired for the sex offender program.

2001-2005

Tough budget times necessitated review of high caseloads, staff layoffs and unfilled positions resulting in negatively impacted services and treatment groups. Prison overcrowding became a major issue but was difficult to navigate with dwindling resources in Community Based Corrections. Second District entered into an income offset agreement to collect owed money from offenders through their income tax refunds. Drug Courts were established in Cerro Gordo County. Accreditation was completed on Administration, Personnel, Fiscal, Programming and ICON with very favorable feedback in all areas.

2006-2010

District Director and Assistant Director work with the National Institute of Corrections to develop a Comprehensive Parole Strategy. Prison Rape elimination Act is implemented. Law requires all felons to have DNA samples on record and sex offender risk assessments begin to be implemented. The Fort Dodge Community Corrections Center is built. Prison Re-Entry Initiative becomes a large focus with coordination of transition from prison to community corrections setting. Grant funded family programming begins to be instituted. Due to retirements several new staff were hired and a new Director, Dot Faust, was hired for the district. Budget cuts have resulted in challenging years along with the closure of the Sac City office in 2010.

2011-Present

Department staff continues to work diligently within stricter budget constraints. Organizational culture change and completing the strategic planning process have been crucial in implementing positive change. As a Department all were committed to adopting a more participative management approach. Committee work, with wide representation of all work units and staff, continues to be a district wide focus. Reorganization of some county distribution, office coverage and supervisors has occurred upon recommendation of committee work. A redefined Minimum Risk Program has been deployed District wide. A pilot project begins in Fort Dodge, Marshalltown and Mason City for all officers to be supervised out of the field office and all officers will supervise residential offenders. Sex Offender staff begin to supervise offenders according to individual risk assessments. All Second District staff continues to advance the mission of enhancing public safety through risk reduction in 2013.







Pretrial Release with Supervision


Pretrial Release with Supervision refers to defendants who are released under the supervision of the Department while awaiting trial, rather than being released on their own recognizance or held in jail on bond. Defendants are supervised by Probation/Parole Officers, who monitor the defendant's whereabouts and activities within the community. Due to their pre-conviction status, treatment programming is offered to defendants on a voluntary basis, unless ordered by the Court.















Pre-Sentence Investigations

Pre-Sentence Investigations (PSI) are conducted by Probation/Parole Officers to provide a comprehensive report to judges to assist in determining appropriate sentencing options. Included in each report is information about the Defendant's present offense, prior criminal record, employment, education, family, substance abuse and psychological histories. Utilizing this information, Probation/Parole Officers provide sentencing and treatment recommendations to the Court. The presentence report also provides valuable information to other correctional staff who may later supervise the offender.










Probation Supervision


Probation supervision provides the Court an alternative to institutionalization whereby convicted offenders remain in the community under correctional supervision. Offenders undergo risk and need assessments, case planning and referrals to local community resources. Probation/Parole Officers monitor compliance and progress, report information, facilitate behavioral change and make recommendations to the Court. The Department supervises both felony and misdemeanant probationers who are placed under its supervision by the Court.
















Parole Supervision


Parole supervision provides supervised conditional release of offenders who are returning to the community from prison or work release. Probation/Parole Officers conduct risk and need assessments, make treatment/community referrals, assist with transition back into the community, facilitate behavioral change and monitor compliance and progress similar to Probation.






















Interstate Compact Supervision


Interstate Compact supervision is provided for offenders who had been granted probation or parole in other states, but whose supervision has been transferred to the State of Iowa. Offenders undergo risk and need assessments, case planning and referrals to local community resources similar to that provided to Iowa probation/parole offenders. The Department supervises both felony and misdemeanant probationers/parolees who are placed under its supervision by Interstate Compact.















Special Sentence


Special Sentence supervision is restricted to Sex Offenders who have been convicted of sexual offenses by the Court and under chapter 709 of the Iowa Code for additional supervision. Offenders convicted of class B or C felonies will serve their required sentence length and then be placed on Lifetime Special Sentence supervision. Offenders convicted of class D felonies or misdemeanors will serve their required sentence length and then be placed on 10 year Special Sentence supervision. Special Sentences are similar to a Parole status and offenders are supervised by a Sex Offender Officer (Probation/Parole Officer III).







Special Sentence offenders will remain under Correctional Supervision for a period of 10 years or Lifetime of the offender. Due to longer length of supervision for these offenders, closures will be at a minimum and when closures do occur the majority will be Unsuccessful (i.e. Revoked, Revoked to Work Release).








The Department's Residential Centers provide supervision and programming in a structured environment that promotes stability, accountability and long term behavior change. Residents are required to work and fulfill their financial responsibilities, including family support, victim restitution, court costs and payments towards debts, taxes and rent to the Department. In addition, residents must undergo appropriate assessments and follow-through with all recommended treatment. During each residents stay, they are awarded furloughs from the facility based on satisfactory performance. Those who successfully complete their stay are moved to regular Probation or Parole supervision.


The Residential Centers accept both probationers referred directly by the Courts and work releases from the State Correctional Institutions. The Residential Centers also serve offenders who have been placed in the OWI inmate program. The Department also maintains contracts with the Federal Bureau of Prisons by which federal clients are placed in the residential centers in Ames, Fort Dodge and Mason City, with the Department being reimbursed for the actual daily cost of each federal offender. The total capacity of the four Residential Centers in Second District is 207 offenders.















Intensive Supervision Program


The Intensive Supervision Program (ISP) provides a more-intensive level of field supervision for higher risk offenders. Many offenders placed in the program have just been released from a Residential Center or Prison. Offenders supervised under ISP are closely monitored by an ISP officer (Probation/Parole Officer III). Offenders are required to attend substance abuse treatment or other treatment programs that correspond to their individual needs. Offenders who successfully complete the program are transferred to regular Probation or Parole supervision and are supervised according to their respective risk score.

Due to the intensity of services offered the Department attempts to keep caseload sizes smaller, approximately thirty offenders per officer. Evidence Based outcomes also show an increase in success of higher risk offenders when caseloads are in that range.













Intensive Supervision - Sex Offenders


The Intensive Supervision – Sex Offender program provides a more-intensive level of Probation or Parole supervision for high risk offenders whose offenses (current or prior) involved sexual deviancy. Offenders supervised under the Intensive Supervision – Sex Offender program are typically seen weekly by a Sex Offender Unit Officer (Probation/Parole Officer III) and close monitoring/surveillance of the offender's performance within the community is maintained. Offenders are required to attend the Department's Sex Offender Treatment Program and any other treatment program(s) that correspond to their individual needs. To assess progress in treatment, participation in the program requires the offender to complete polygraphs on a period basis. Offenders who are placed into the Sex Offender Program remain in the program until their probation or parole period expires.

Due to the intensity of services offered, the Department attempts to keep caseload sizes smaller, approximately twenty-five to thirty offenders per officer.














Minimum Risk Program

The Minimum Risk Program provides limited supervision and monitoring activities for offenders who are considered low risk to re-offend. Offenders are assigned to a Probation/Parole Officer based upon risk assessment score, informed of their court ordered obligations and responsibilities for supervision. The Department initiated a redeveloped Minimum Risk Program at the end of FY2011 and the beginning of FY2012 and the initial focus was placed on six counties in the District. Those counties consisted of Hardin, Marshall, Story, Boone, Greene and Carroll. Full implementation of the Minimum Risk Program was deployed to the remaining sixteen counties in the District in FY2013.













Electronic Monitoring

Electronic Monitoring is utilized as a supervision tool to monitor the offender's activities in the community and to promote accountability. These tools are typically used by a Probation/Parole Officer III during the course of supervising high risk offenders. The types of electronic equipment used are Radio Frequency (ankle bracelets), Voice Recognition (voice patterns used during phone checks), Global Positioning (satellite tracking of offender movement) and SCRAM (remote alcohol testing – randomly calls the offender and conducts a breath test).









The cost for electronic monitoring equipment is budgeted and paid for through an appropriation that Fifth Judicial District receives for all eight judicial districts. Fifth Judicial District distributes the equipment according to need. Any judicial district using equipment in excess of its budgeted allotment is billed for the overage.

Second Judicial District did not exceed its budgeted allocation.




Domestic Abuse Program


Any offender convicted of or receiving a deferred judgment for domestic abuse is required by Iowa law to participate in the **Domestic Abuse Program**. Offenders do not have to be placed under the department's supervision to participate. Not all offenders in the program have been convicted of domestic abuse and some participants are under supervision to local probation agencies that supervise misdemeanants.


The program consists of an intake/orientation session and twenty-four class sessions. Offenders are assessed fees to cover the costs of the program. The Department's Domestic Abuse Program utilizes the "Duluth" curriculum, Power and Control: Tactics of Men Who Better and the Iowa Addendum for the men's groups. The "Moving On" curriculum is used for women convicted of domestic abuse. In FY2012 the curriculum in Ames was converted to ACTV: Achieving Change through Value-Based Behavior as a pilot program that was developed by the University of Iowa. In FY2013 this pilot curriculum was also be utilized in Marshalltown and Fort Dodge. Additionally, program coordinators arrange for alternative programming for offenders who are found to be inappropriate for the program model or group setting.

Domestic Abuse Program Participation

















Special Services

Initially started as a pilot program in Ames in 1995, treatment services are offered throughout the District and are now referred to as Special Services. Special Services is designed for high-risk and/or high-need offenders who are in need of intensive treatment services. Services offered by the program include in depth assessments and treatment services designed to promote the development of pro-social attitudes and cognitive skills. Assessments and services are provided by the Department's Community Treatment Coordinators (CTC).










OWI Program


The **OWI Program** is provided for offenders convicted of a second or subsequent Operating While Intoxicated charge, as authorized by the Iowa Code, Chapter 904.153. Offenders in this program are considered state inmate status but are able to serve their sentences and participate in treatment in community corrections residential facilities in lieu of prison. Unless offenders discharge their sentence while in the facility they must be released by the Iowa Board of Parole.

The Department provides OWI programming at all four Residential Centers. Substance Abuse treatment services are provided through contracted services with the following Substance Abuse agencies:










Sex Offender Treatment Program













Sex Offender Treatment Group Participation























Thinking for a Change (T4C)

Thinking for a Change (T4C) is an integrated, cognitive behavior change program for offenders that include cognitive restructuring, social skills development, and development of problem solving skills. During the programs 24 sessions, offenders are able to practice skills taught through role playing different situations in their lives and sharing each week how they have implemented the ideas discussed during the course. The target population referred to this group is moderate to high risk male offenders. The department will and has offered programming to female offenders but the groups are not coed.










Re-Entry Program

The Department's **Re-Entry Program** is a partnership between the Department of Corrections (IDOC) and Second District. IDOC institution counselors assess the offender, completed a Re-Entry Case Plan and refer offender to appropriate services. The Department provides "Reach In" services where Special Services staff contacts the offender while in prison to initiate a release plan. Department staff also provides transition services to the offender during the first six months of release to the community on work release or parole.











Moving On

Moving On is a twenty-six session curriculum based program developed exclusively for female offenders. The primary goal of the program is to provide women with alternatives and choices free from criminal activity by assisting them in identifying and mobilizing personal and community resources. The program assists women with reintegration to the community and relies on a combination of methods and strategies drawn from a variety of approaches including Solution-Focused Intervention, Motivation Enhancement Therapy and Cognitive/Behavioral Skills Training. This program is also used as the Domestic Abuse Program for females convicted of domestic violence and also provided is a Moving On Aftercare program.









Comprehensive Aftercare Program (CAP)

Continuing care is a vital component for successful, long-term behavior change. **CAP** is a cognitive/behavioral intervention designed to assist participants in maintaining desired behavior change. CAP is an open-ended group and participants are encouraged to attend twelve sessions. Utilizing the <u>Stages of Change</u> strategy, CAP employs Motivational Interviewing techniques to assist participants in anticipating and planning for risk situations, increasing self-efficacy and utilizing developed skills to sustain desired change. Clients referred to CAP have completed a primary program such as Substance Abuse treatment, Domestic Abuse Program or other cognitive programming.








Recidivism Statistics

Iowa Department of Corrections (IDOC) defines **Recidivism** "as subsequent convictions for felonies or aggravated misdemeanors of offenders who discharged (final closure) from correctional supervision within the Fiscal Year range". The standard which IDOC follows is new convictions to prison for any aggravated misdemeanor or higher offense with three years of final discharge from corrections. When reporting data for Recidivism statistics it is then common practice to use offender final closure data from a fiscal year three years prior.





Closure Types

As previously noted, ICON was first implemented by community-based corrections on August 1, 2000. With its implementation, new standardized definitions were implemented for various correctional activities. As follows are the specific Closure Reasons (i.e. Completed Requirements, Revoked) that correspond to each Closure Type (Successful, Unsuccessful, Administrative, and Intermediate Sanction). Please note that the Closure Reasons and Closure Types are specific to Supervision Statuses, Specialized Supervision (Specialty) and Intervention Closure Types.
